


## CAROLINA WOMEN LEAD.

## The Shaffer Family

Carolina Women's Leadership Council member Caroline Shaffer Vroon '91 hails from a six-generation Tar Heel family renowned for its profound legacy of philanthropy at Carolina and beyond. Her grandfather, Charles Shaffer Sr. '35, served as the University's inaugural director of development for an impressive 29-year tenure, overseeing Carolina's first comprehensive capital campaign, the Carolina Challenge (1977-80).

Caroline's father, Charlie Shaffer Jr. '64, transitioned from a successful 36-year law career in Atlanta to focus his talents in the nonprofit world, becoming CEO of Marcus Autism Center and later serving as vice president for institutional advancement at The Westminster Schools. Notably, he co-chaired the Carolina First Campaign (2006-13), a monumental effort that raised \$2.1 billion.

In 2021, the Shaffer family endured a heartbreaking loss as Charlie passed away at 79 due to Alzheimer's disease. Before his health declined, Charlie went public with his disease by giving speeches and devoting his time to raising funds for research in hopes of finding a cure for future generations.

In his memory, the family — siblings Caroline, Emi Gragnani '99 and Charles Shaffer III and their mother, Harriet Shaffer — established the Charles M. Shaffer Jr. Distinguished Fellow in Philanthropy in the UNC College of Arts and Sciences. The purpose of the fellowship is to recognize a highly accomplished professional with extensive philanthropic experience who will help students study the social, political and moral roles of giving back in today's world. The Shaffer family hopes this fellowship will help students study effective philanthropy and inspire them for action and leadership in giving back to their communities.
